- **Responsibilities/ Goals of Organization:** Reduce infant mortality rates, reduce the number of low birth weight babies, and improve health and development outcomes.
- **Service Area:** Escambia County
- **Size of Organization** (# of employees, annual budget, total # served annually, total # served in Escambia County annually)

Healthy Start Coalition



- **Overall organizational outcomes** Mission: To improve the health of babies through community partnerships; Vision: Escambia County is a community fully invested in healthy families
- **Tied to which contributing indicators** (if not included in subsequent program slides) pre-term birth rates, teen pregnancy rates, high quality parent/caregiver child interaction, children screened by a appropriate tool, birth rate by age of mother

Program 2: FIMR

- **Key Partners in Program:** OBs, pediatricians, social service providers
- **Tied to which contributing indicators:** preterm birth
- **Program outcomes:** Development of programs and services to improve birth outcomes

Program 3: Care Coordination



- **Goals of Program:** Provide education and support to women and infants to improve birth and developmental outcomes
- **Target Audience/ Participants** (include numbers served, eligibility requirements): All pregnant women and infants are screened for risk; clients with identified risks are referred; others are self-referred or referred by other agencies; serve an average of

- **Key Partners in Program:** multiple social service agencies, local OBs and pediatricians, birthing facilities
- **Tied to which contributing indicators:** high quality parent interaction, preterm birth, age of mother at birth, child screened by an appropriate tool

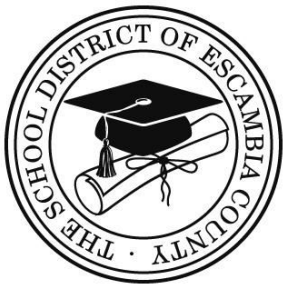

Reading Pal Program

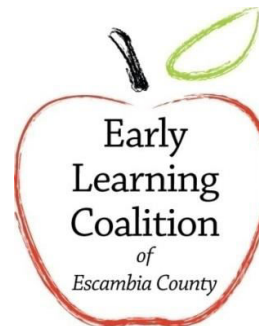
Started as a pilot project- Summer 2010, launched as school year program 2011-12

- In 2015-16, 227 Reading Pals volunteered for 3,827 hours with 224 students from 15 classrooms (Gibson Head Start (7), Global Learning Academy (1), McMillan Pre-K (1), Montclair Elementary (2), Weis Elementary (3), A Top Notch Christian Academy (1).
- As of February 2017, 213 Reading Pals are volunteering with 209 students in 17 classrooms: Gibson (7), GLA (1), McMillan (4), Montclair (2), Weis (3).
- Total 2016-17 Hours as of 1/31/17: 2700
- All participating students are assessed with Florida VPK Assessment
- Family Involvement: ECARE participates in partner parent education events
- Greatest Challenge- Circumstances over which we have no control
- Greatest Opportunity- Positively impacting students with educational disadvantages at an early age
- Bright Spot – Matchmaking success stories



Reading Pal Program Goals

Match every four year old student in targeted pre-kindergarten classrooms with an adult volunteer who meets with them for one hour every week during the school year.

Reach 25 Reading Pal hours (min 12 hours) per student



Reading Pal Program Goals

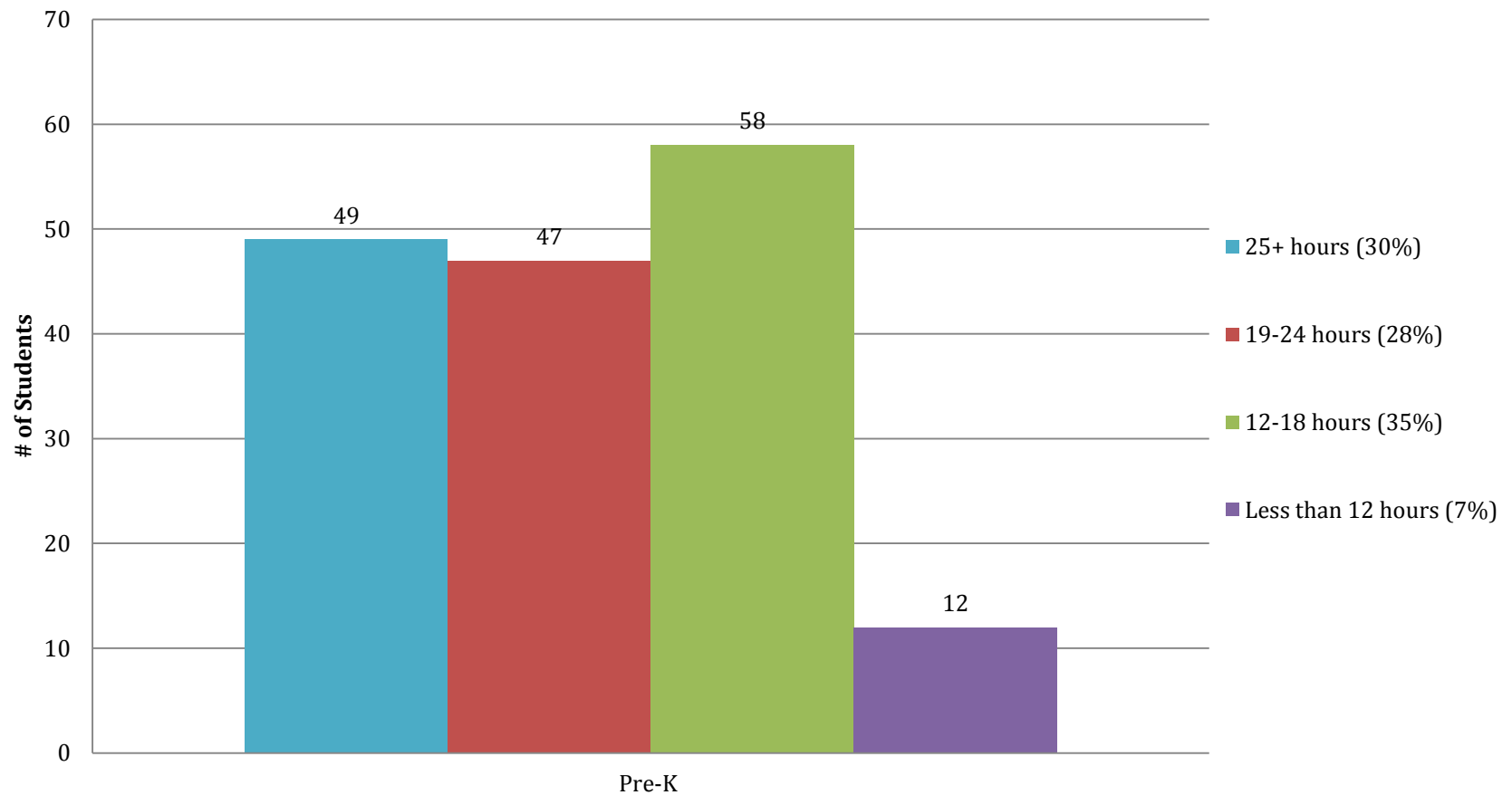
Recruit and retain an enthusiastic team of volunteers.

Meet every child where they are and move them forward.

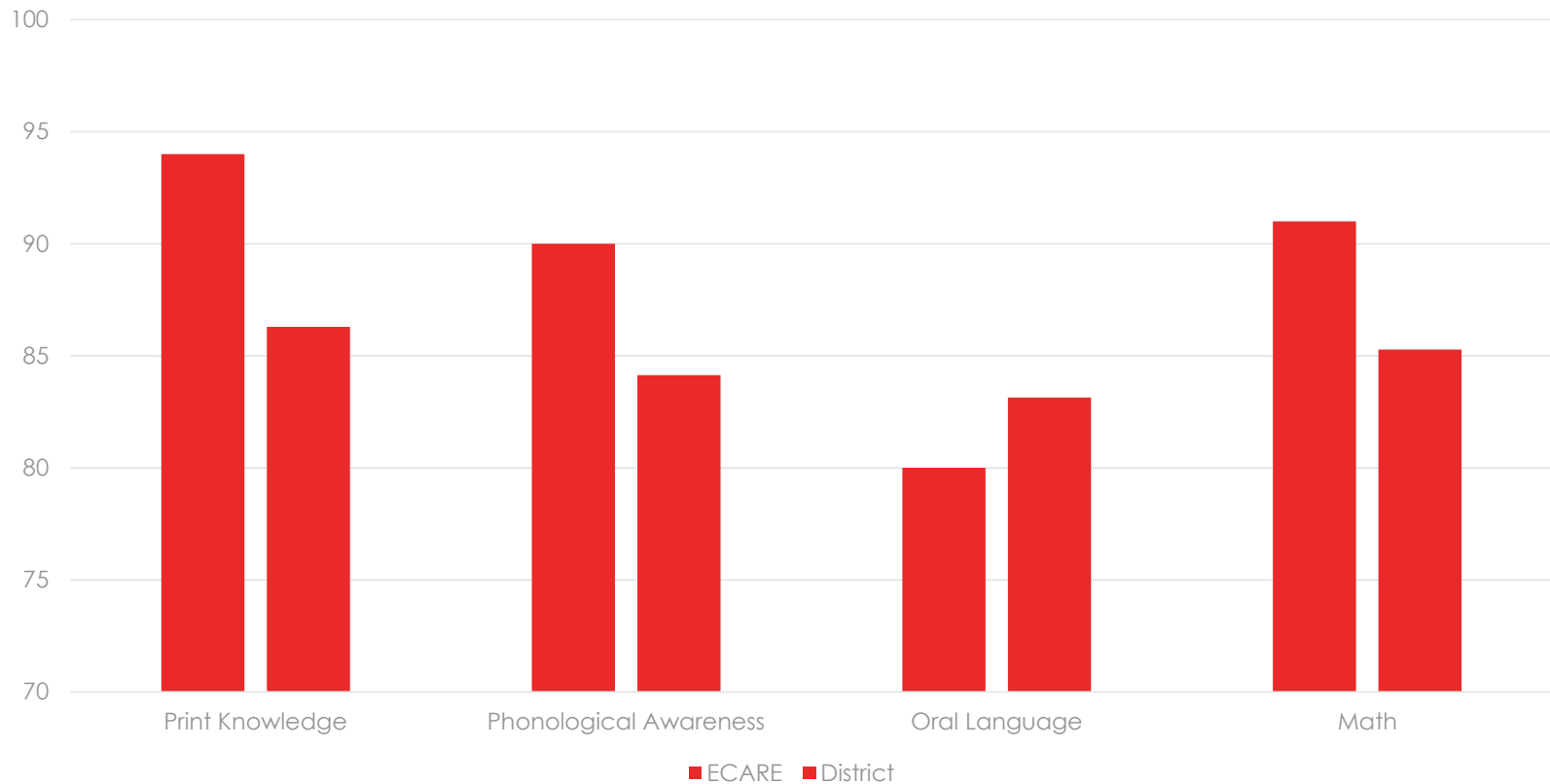


Student Reading Pal Hours



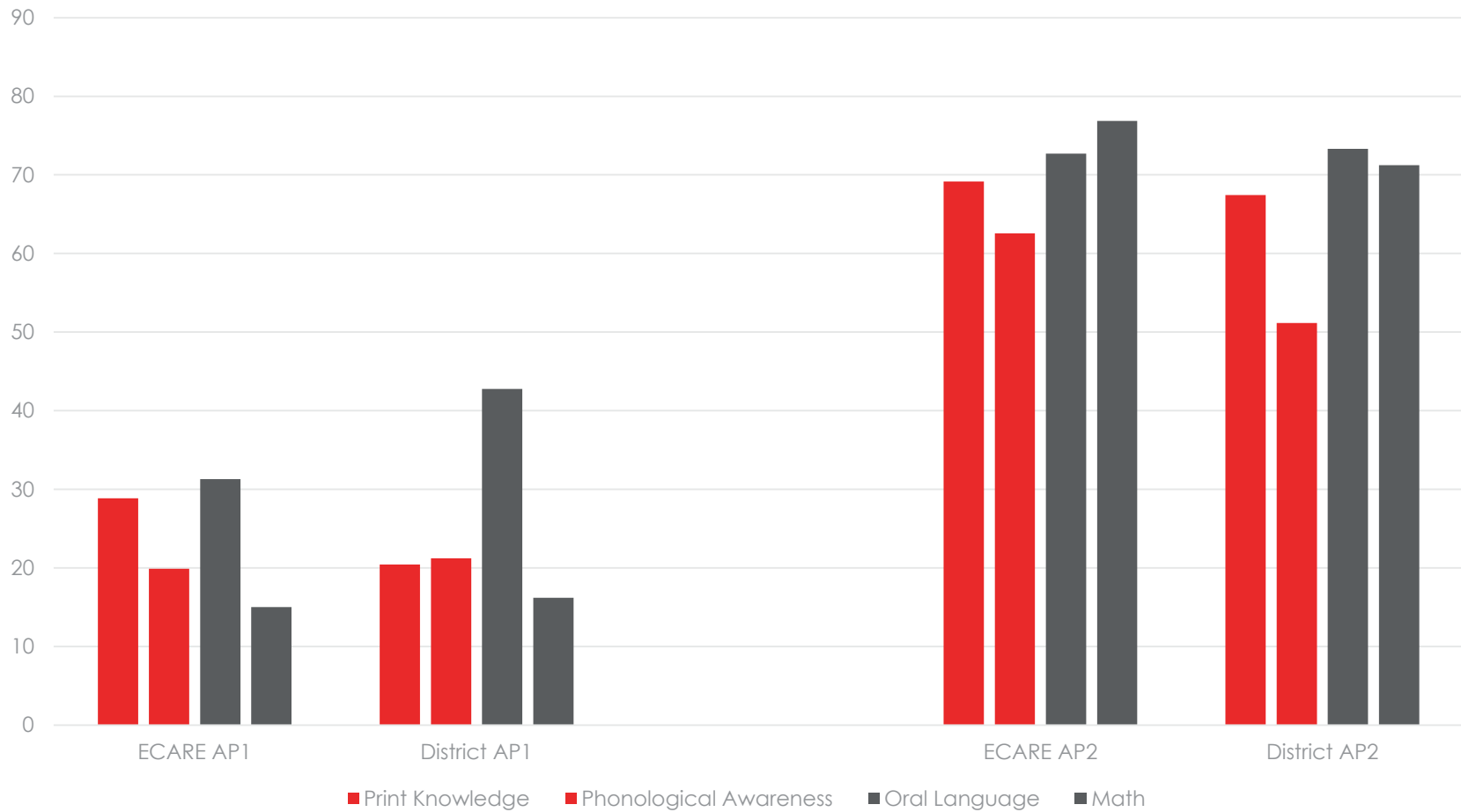


2015-16 AP 3 Comparison

Capstone Learning Academy Overview

Capstone Adaptive Learning and Therapy Centers, Inc.



- **Responsibilities/ Goals of Organization:** To provide educational and therapeutic programs for individuals of all ages with (and without) developmental disabilities to achieve/maintain independence for a better quality of life.
- **Service Area:** Escambia and Santa Rosa County
 - Size of Organization
 - 125 FT/PT staff
 - \$4.2 million
 - over 400 children and adults served last year (direct service, does not include families/ caregivers/siblings who are also impacted by our services)
 - 200 in Escambia last year
- **Years in Operation in Escambia County**
 - 64 years (est. 1953 as United Cerebral Palsy of NW Florida)
- **Funding Sources**
 - Agency for Persons with Disabilities, School Districts, Early Learning Coalitions, Early Steps, insurances, grants, United Way, fund raisers, individual donors

Capstone Adaptive Learning and Therapy Centers, Inc.



- **Overall organizational outcomes:** Help children and adults improve/maintain independence via educational and therapeutic programs
- **Tied to which contributing indicators:** High quality parent/caregiver interactions, children enrolled in high quality early education programs; enrolled in VPK; % of children 0-5 screened by appropriate tool
- **Have any parent education/engagement components?** Parents have the opportunity to engage in training with ABA therapists, BCBA consults with teachers, therapists and parents regarding student behavior and provides parent training sessions to assist in establishing coordination between school/home.
- **Greatest Challenge:** Transportation (VPK); Funding levels for therapy and educational services; Community support for our small population who have disabilities people do not understand.
- **Greatest Opportunity:** Helping people achieve independence to reduce or eliminate future need for limited community supports.
- **Bright Spot:** Perhaps our growth...from 4 students in our ESE program 12 years ago to a total of approximately 50-55 each year and the subsequent kindergarten success of many of these students.

Voluntary PreKindergarten



- **Goals of Program**: Developmentally appropriate instruction to prepare 4 years olds for kindergarten readiness and for future successful educational experiences.
- **Target Audience/ Participants**: Serve up to eleven (11) 4 year olds (on or before September 1) in each class
- **Years in existence in Escambia County**: 11
- **Key Partners in Program**: Early Learning Coalition
- **Tied to which contributing indicators**: High quality parent/caregiver interactions; enrolled in high quality early education programs; enrolled in VPK program; % of children ages 0-5 screened by appropriate tool
- **Program outcomes**: Increase the % of children who enter kindergarten who meet readiness level criteria.

PreK ESE program



- **Goals of Program:** Prepare students through educational and therapeutic services for kindergarten readiness with/without support once in kindergarten
- **Target Audience/ Participants:** Approximately 30-35 per year in Escambia County; must be evaluated and identified with a primary exceptionality and have goals/strategies established through an Individual Education Plan (IEP); must be between 3-5 years old
- **Years in existence in Escambia County:** 13
- **Key Partners in Program:** Escambia County School District, Sacred Heart Hospital Autism Center, United Way, Early Steps
- **Tied to which contributing indicators:** Enrolled in high quality early education program; % of children 0-5 screened by appropriate tool; high quality parent/caregiver interaction; premature birth rate; children 0-5 in foster care
- **Program outcomes:** To provide the necessary support to move children through developmental stages in an effort to get them ready for enrollment in kindergarten programs with or without continuing support through unique accommodations for each child.

Our Time After School Program



- **Goals of Program:** To provide a safe, nurturing after school program for children with special needs from ages 3 – 22.
- **Target Audience/ Participants:** Our primary participants are students of working parents who cannot leave their child at home unsupervised due to special needs conditions; enrollment varies from 8 – 15 students served during the year.
- **Years in existence in Escambia County:** Approximately 20 years
- **Key Partners in Program:** Early Learning Coalition (vouchers); Department of Children and Families; United Way
- **Tied to which contributing indicators:** High quality parent/caregiver interaction; premature birth rate; children ages 0-5 in foster care; children ages 0-5 who have received a verified maltreatment abuse report
- **Program outcomes:** Consistent attendance at school and after school care; improvement in meeting IEP goals; parents are able to remain employed with safe care provided for their child not only on school days but also during breaks, including summer, thereby allowing year round employment of parents.

- **Goals of Program:** To provide needed therapies (Speech, Occupational and Physical) to identified children to assist in development of skills necessary for success in PreK or kindergarten programs.
- **Target Audience/ Participants:** Children from 3 months to 12 years of age. The number of children served yearly ranges from 65-85.
- **Years in existence in Escambia County:** Approximately 20 years
- **Key Partners in Program:** Early Steps
- **Tied to which contributing indicators:** High quality parent/caregiver interaction; premature birth rate; children ages 0-5 in foster care; children ages 0-5 who have received a verified maltreatment abuse report; % of children 0-5 screened by appropriate tool.
- **Program outcomes:** To assist children in developmental growth through therapy services to be at the developmental level that corresponds to their age.

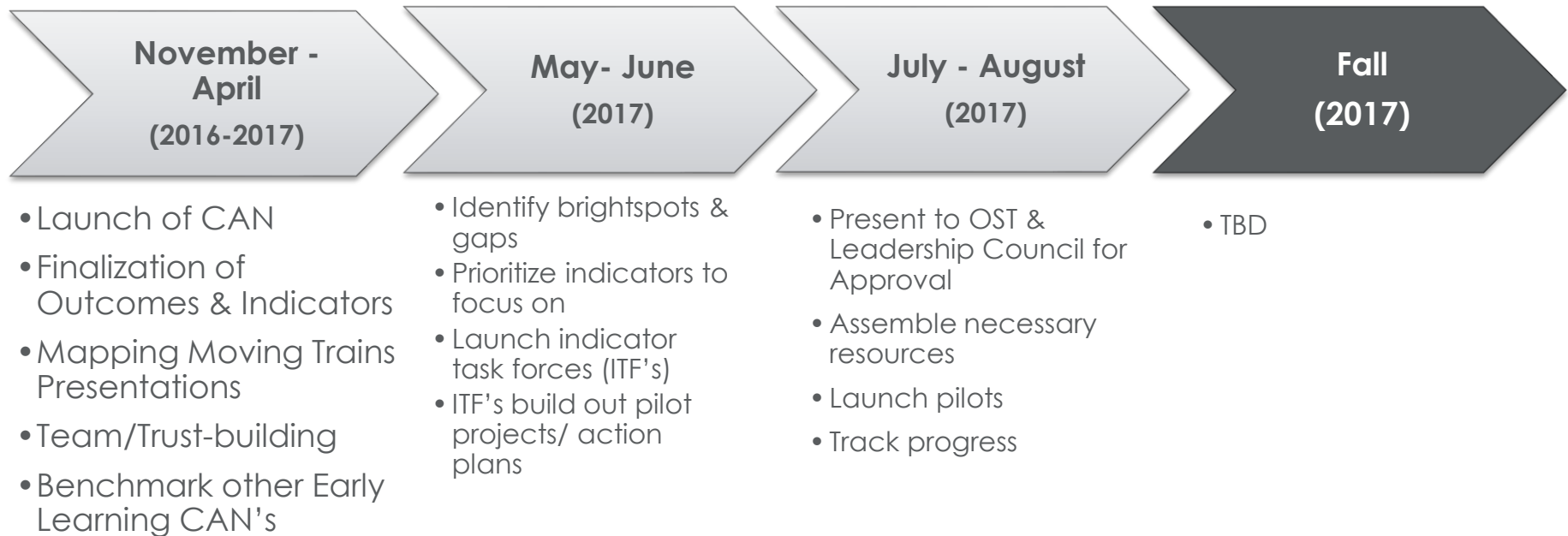
